Primary Objectives

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➤ Identify & create online directory of all small archival repositories in five-county Philadelphia area

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- > Survey archival collections of these repositories & make descriptive information on the collections publicly available in online searchable database

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- > Promote findings of project to historical community and archival profession

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To be eligible for inclusion, an institution must:

- Be a private, non-profit institution whose primary mission is history related
- Not employ a full-time professional archivist
- Have archival collections available to the public

There are an estimated 120-150 small archival repositories in five-county Philadelphia area

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Phase One: 14-month pilot project, July 2011-September 2012, focusing on two counties: Philadelphia & Montgomery

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- Phase Two: 2-year project, October 2012-October 2014, focusing on entire five-county Philadelphia area: Bucks, Chester, & Delaware Counties, and remaining repositories in Philadelphia & Montgomery Counties

Phase I Results (through September 2012)


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- Surveyed & assessed archival holdings of 47 repositories:
 541 collections totaling 4,666 linear feet of materials
- ➤ Created summary finding aids to 541 collections; posted these finding aids to publicly accessible online searchable database
- ➤ Issued detailed reports to repositories, including collections descriptions & assessments and information for managing their archival holdings



Yellow = Historical societies (22)


Red = Historic sites (14)

Hidden Collections Initiative for Pennsylvania Small Archival Repositories

The Hidden Collections Initiative for Pennsylvania Small Archival Repositories (HCI-PSAR) is a project of the Historical Society of Pennsylvania, funded by grants from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation. The goal of the project is to make better known and more accessible the largely hidden archival collections of the many small, primarily volunteer-run historical organizations in the five-county Philadelphia area, such as local historical societies, historic sites, and small museums. During the initial fourteenmonth pilot phase of the project, which ran from July 2011 to September 2012, project staff surveyed 541 archival collections in 47 small repositories in Philadelphia and Montgomery counties. Summary finding aids to these collections are now publicly available on this website. The second phase of the project, which will run from October 2012 to October 2014, focuses on small repositories in Bucks, Chester, and Delaware counties.

Summary finding aids to the archival collections in these additional repositories will be added to this website on an ongoing basis over the course of the project.

About the Repositories



1st Regiment Infantry Museum

The 1st Regiment Infantry, Pennsylvania, or "The Dandy First," is recognized by the United States Army as the oldest continuously existing command in the Pennsylvania National Guard, and the only existing Pennsylvania unit with service in the Continental Army, representing Pennsylvania. Now designated the 103rd Engineer Battalion Pennsylvania Army National Guard, the unit has fought in nearly every major American war, initially being involved in the French and Indian War and then the Revolutionary War. The 103rd Engineer Battalion Armory today houses the 1st Regiment Infantry Museum dedicated to the history of this storied command. Its archival collections are comprised of over 100 linear feet of materials dating from 1812, including regiment minute books, roll books, officers' letter books, account books, and photograph albums.


The archival collections of the American Swedish Historical Museum are comprised of materials relating to Swedish and Swedish-American culture and history. These materials include papers of prominent individuals, such as Jenny Lind and John Ericsson, as well as of community organizations. The archival collections comprise 79 linear feet of materials and span from 1702 to 1994.

The family remained in the area through several generations.



Abstract

Samuel Whitakur Permypacker (1843-1916) served as governor of Pennsylvania from 1903-1907. A prominent Philadelphia Inwyer, judge, and president of the Himorical Society of Pennsylvania from 1900 to 1916, Pennypacker also authored excee than fifty books and publisations. The Samuel W. Pennypacker family papers at Pennypacker Mills, 1821-1980, is a well documented collection that reflects the interests of Samuel W. Pennypacker, his tenn as governor of Pennsylvania, the construction of the State Capitol, Pennsylvania history, family history, and Pennsylvania German culture. Pennypacker, copybooks containing more than 25,000 letters received by Pennypacker, copybooks containing more than 13,000 letters he wrote, his notes and writings on his family genealogy, and documents Samuel collected for autographs, including more than 300 deeds of custom Pennsylvania dating from 1682 to 1915. Biographical/Historical Note

Samuel W. Pennypucker was born in Phoenixville, Pennylvania in 1845. He descended from Hendrick Pannybukkee, a Duckimun who worked as a surveyor for Wilsiam Penn, His grandfisher, Matthias Pennypucker, was a member of the General Assembly who helped write the state constitution in 1837; he was also president of the Philadelphia and Reading Railroad. Samuel's mother, Anna Maria Whitaker, came from a family that owned a local insusvoka. His father, base Pennypucker, was the first burgess of Phoenixville and held a purciousorship at the Philadelphia Medical College.

Isaac Pennypuckier died white Samuel was still a boy, and the family moved in with his maternal grandfuther, Joseph Whitaker. Samuel prepared for Yale University, but Whitaker refused to pay taition until the boy had proven himself in the workforce. In 1863 Samuel entisted in Company F of Pointown, 26th Pennsylvania Emergency Regiment, which was the first force to neet the rehels at Gethysburg. Afterward, Whitaker was satisfied, and arranged for Samuel to study law at the University of Pennsylvania. He careed his bachelor of laws fegure in 1866 and established his own law practice. By the ord of the decade he received a doctor of laws from Franklin and Marshall College.

Permypocier served on the Philadelphia Board of Education and was appointed judge of the Court of Common Piens of Philadelphia. He became president of the Historical Society of Permsylvania in 1900 and wrote extensively on early local and state history, English common law, the Supreme Court, genealogical topics, and several historical figures. In 1902 Permypocker was elected governor of Permyslvania with the support of veterans, agricultural interests, firmer governor and Civil War hero James Beaver, and President Theodore Roosevelt.

As governar of Pennsylvania from 1903 to 1907, Pennsylvania; he established Departments of Pennsylvania State Archives and the State Massaum of Pennsylvania; he established Departments of Health, Highwaya, Mines, and Fisheries; he created the first statewide police force in 1905, whose integrity and efficiency earned seclaim from President Roosevelt and made it a model for other states. Pennsylacker supported the Child Labor Act of 1905, which set a minimum age for factory and mine work and outlawed most night work. In 1906, Governor Pennsylacker dedicated Pennsylvania's new Capitol haidling.

Pennypacker Mills, originally bailt around 1720, was purchased in 1747 by Peter Pennebucker. During the American Revolutionary War, George Washington used the Mills in 1777 as a headquarters prior to the Battle of Germantenem, and also as a field hospital for injuried solution after the bottle. Samuel Pennypacker mode the Mills his summer house in the early 1700s, and died there in 1916. The house continued to be occupied by his wife, Virginia Earle Broomall Pennypacker (1845-1922), and their children, Josephine Whitaker Pennypacker (1872-1962), Eliza Broomall Pennypacker (1874-1962). Azan Maria Whitaker Pennypacker (1876-1952), and Bevan Aubrey Pennypacker (1881-1954). The last Pennypacker to live in the Mills believe it became public property was Bevan Pennypacker's son, Samuel Pennypacker Ir. Samoel Pennypacker Iv. was interested in archaeology and antibeopology and stadied with Franc Boas.

Scope and Content Note

A large segment of the Pennypacker family papers is comprised of letters received by Samuel W. Pennypacker and his wife, children, grandson, and parents, and date from 1823-1990. The majority of this corrusposdetor is to Samuel Pennypacker between 1860-1916 and includes forters dating from his time as a soldier in 1863, personal fetters from family and friends, business letters to his law practice, letters fruiting his genealogy, correspondence with various associations of which be was a member, correspondence from his term as governor of Pennsylvania (1903-1907), and corruspondence about his remodeling and landscaping of Pennypacker Mills. There are also 13 copy books of letters written by Samuel W. Pentrypacker (1872-1916).

The Permypucker family papers also contain financial and estate records of various Permypucker family numbers; certificans, diplomas, and associatin memberships; and manuscripts of speeches by Samuel Permypucker for campagins stops and deflications. Samuel Permypucker was an entilisationts complositor, and crosted many over the course of his lifetime. Most of the scrapbooks in this collection are newspaper clippings scrapbooks, usually articles about Samuel Permypacker's political career, but there are also some Victorian-style monorabilis scrapbooks.

Samuel Pentypicker was a historian, and he was interested in his own genealogy as well as American history. He collected journals, diarries, and letters from his ancestors, and kept voluminous noise about his genealogical research. Pennypucker also collected miscellaneous papers such as deeds, 17th to 19th embary, signed by historical figures.

The Pennypucker family papers contains approximately 2000 photographs, circa 1850-1960. Most are individual portraits of family members and friends, images of the property, and travel photographs. Many photographic techniques are represented in this collection, from daguernotypes and ambeotypes to silver gelatin and albumes prints. There are several photograph albums and many increascopic prints. Of special interest is an album depicting the dedication of the Pennsylvania Capitol, and featuring Theodore Roosevelt. Another interesting album documents an archeological dig funded by Samuel Pennypocker Jr. in 1934.

The remainder of the collection is comprised of newspapers, including the Public Ledger. Daily Postsown Ledger. Philiadelphia Gazette, and Evening Times, 1847-1975; posters; campaign ephemers; and printed pamphilets. 1869-1952.
