

# One Hundred Dollars Reward.

RAN away from the subscriber living near Shepherd's Town, Jefferson County, Virginia, some time in December, 1799, a Negro man, known about home by the name of Briscoe's Jerry, but calls himself Jerry Arthur; he is about 5 feet 8 or 9 inches high, is stout and well made, has a remarkable short thick neck and a four countenance, is marked with the small pox, particularly about his nose, and has a remarkable scar above his left eye; his wool is about six inches long which he wears combed up before; he is an artful cunning fellow, can read tolerably well, can play the fiddle, and it is expected he has a forged pass. He took with him a variety of clothing which he must have worn out or exchanged before this time, it is therefore unnecessary to describe them. He has a wife near Keys' Ferry owned by Mr. John Grove, where he may possibly conceal himself, but it is expected he has gone towards Harrisburg or Philadelphia.

If he is taken within ten miles of home ten dollars will be given for securing him in jail, if twenty miles fifteen dollars, if forty miles twenty dollars, if sixty miles twenty five dollars, if eighty miles thirty dollars, and if one hundred and fifty miles the above reward and reasonable charges, if brought home and delivered to me
