During the Civil War, political parties often raised support for their cause through torchlight processions, or parades. Sometimes these processions, which resembled political rallies like we have today, became heated or violent. In this case, a man named James Campbell was killed in a fight that broke out during a procession held by the Democratic Party.

Using context clues, what do you think a torchlight procession would have looked like? Remember, Americans in the Civil War did not have electricity or flashlights.
