New Issue of PMHB Explores History of Energy in PA

The story of Pennsylvania is inextricably linked to the history of energy—from the forests and waters of Penn Woods, to the anthracite and bituminous coal fields of the northeast and southwest corners of the state, up to the natural gas trapped in the state's Marcellus Shale formation. Throughout its history, Pennsylvania has fueled the nation.

The <u>latest special issue</u> [1] of *The Pennsylvania Magazine of History and Biography* (*PMHB*) explores these legacies of energy production and mineral extraction in the commonwealth, bringing together articles examining the history of several energy sources, including coal, oil, electricity, and natural gas.
