

Barbary Pirates

- During the 18th and 19th centuries the Barbary Pirates, a group operating out of North Africa, took captive many U.S. merchant ships in hopes of a large ransom from the government for their return.
- Richard O'Brien is just one U.S. citizen who was captured by the Barbary pirates in 1785 while commanding the ship *Dauphin*.
- O'Brien recorded his experiences on the African continent in his correspondences with other American officials and personal journals.
- After coming back the U.S., O'Brien returned to North Africa, using his knowledge of the area to act as a Consul to Algiers.


The position held by the Barbary States in the Mediterranean and the state of their political and domestic affairs are described in this journal. It contains some account of the humiliating conditions imposed upon American and European citizens, the "Bey's" haughty attitude toward foreign ambassadors, payment of tribute and ransom exacted for the redemption of prisoners, and the cruel treatment of Christian slaves. The conflicting interests of England, Spain, France, Genoa, Portugal, Russia, Turkey, and other countries are shown in the narrative of their diplomatic activities, wars, naval battles, and the capture of vessels.
