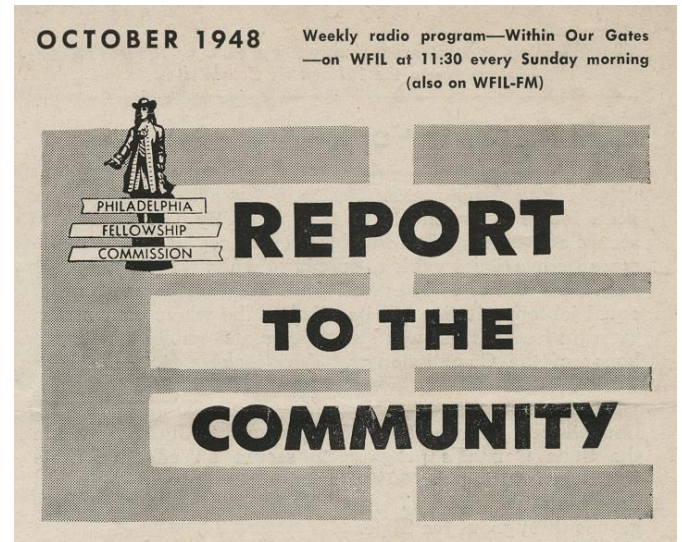


Philadelphia Fellowship Commission

The Philadelphia Fellowship Commission was founded in 1941 as a community service organization with a goal to promote better relations between different racial, ethnic, and religious groups. They worked toward this goal on many fronts, with programs like multicultural education seminars, job assistance, workshops on combating bigotry, and regular reports on local and national civil rights legislation.
